

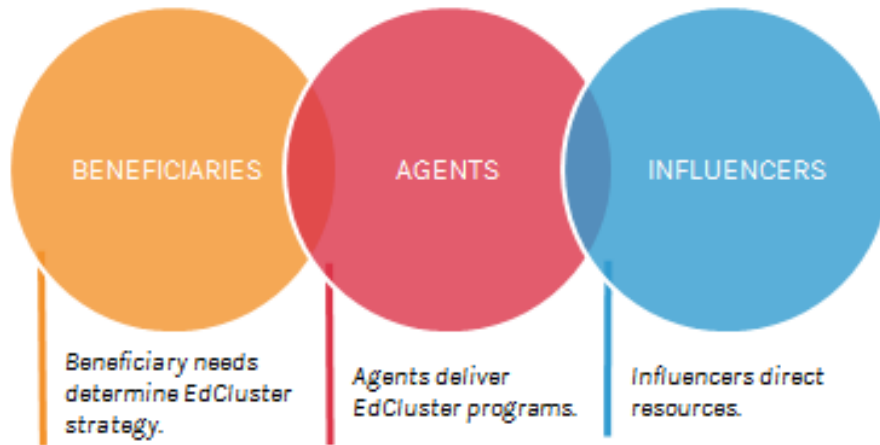

<p>How does this stakeholder uniquely add value to the field? How do their activities complement other stakeholders? Does the stakeholder connect to a key community or group whose voices may not always have been heard?</p> <p>Example: Advocacy leader promoting early learning access; mobilizes network of early ed providers.</p>	<p>Does the stakeholder have access to funding or relationships with potential investors? Do they have capacity to contribute administration, fundraising, or other functional support?</p> <p>Example: Capacity to serve as fiscal agent, provide warm introduction to community foundation.</p>
